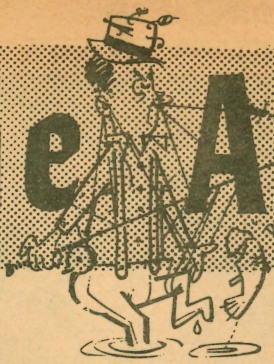

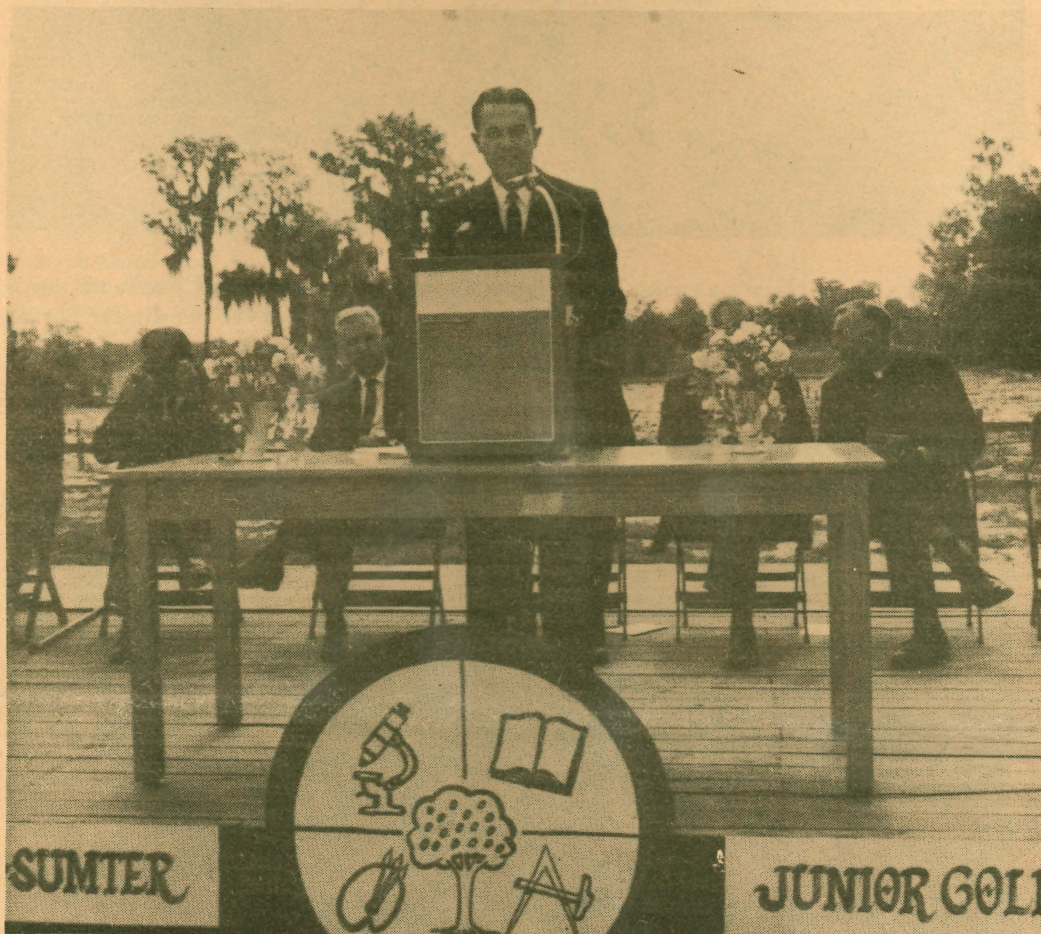

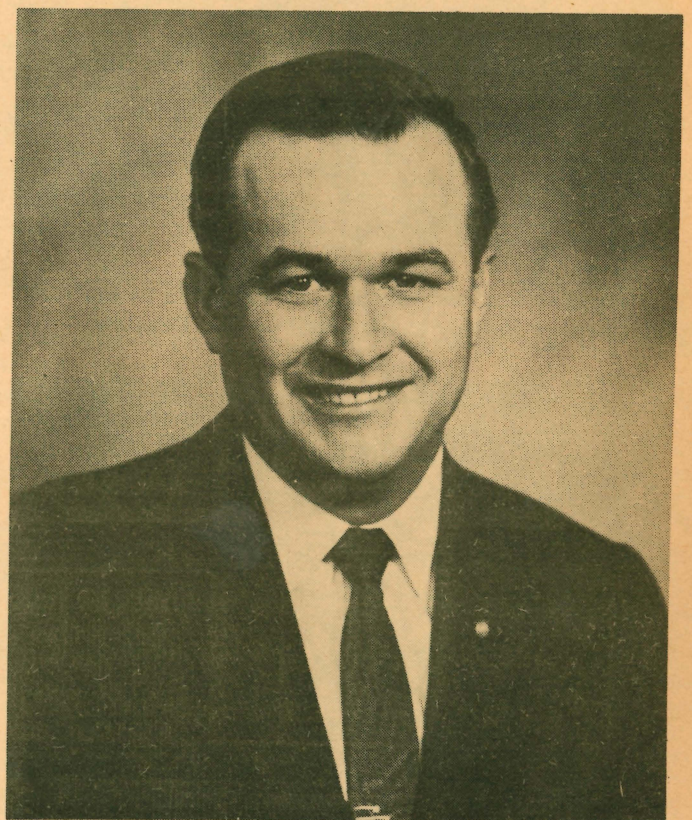
Commencement exercises for graduating students from Lake-Sumter will be held Friday, June 5, 8:00 p.m. in the Leesburg High School Auditorium. The Honorable Doyle Connor, Commissioner of Agriculture for the state of Florida, will deliver the Commencement address. Thirty-nine students are scheduled to receive degrees.

This ceremony is especially significant as these graduates will be the first class to receive the Associate of Arts Degree from Lake-Sumter, now in its second year of operation. Eaddy and Miss Dot Kurras I would also like to extend congratulations for their fine work.

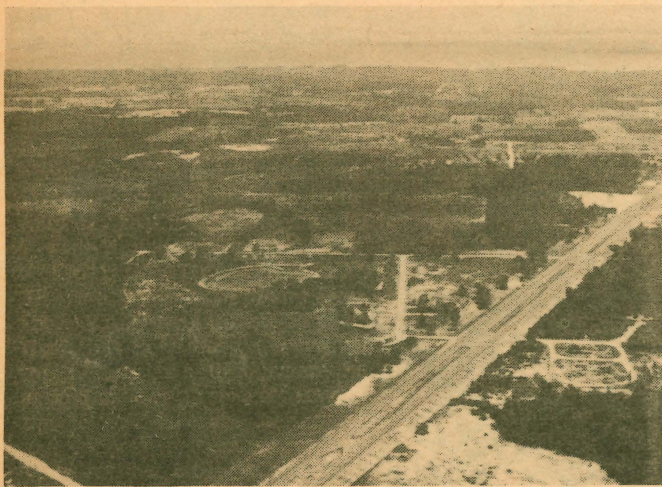
This has been a great year with all its trials and tribulations and its fun, also. There have been many wonderful experiences which will remain with each of us through out our life.

Tim Hatfield as SGA President drove the car with Governor Bryant and Mr. Carlisle Rogers in the motorcade for the LSJC Groundbreaking.



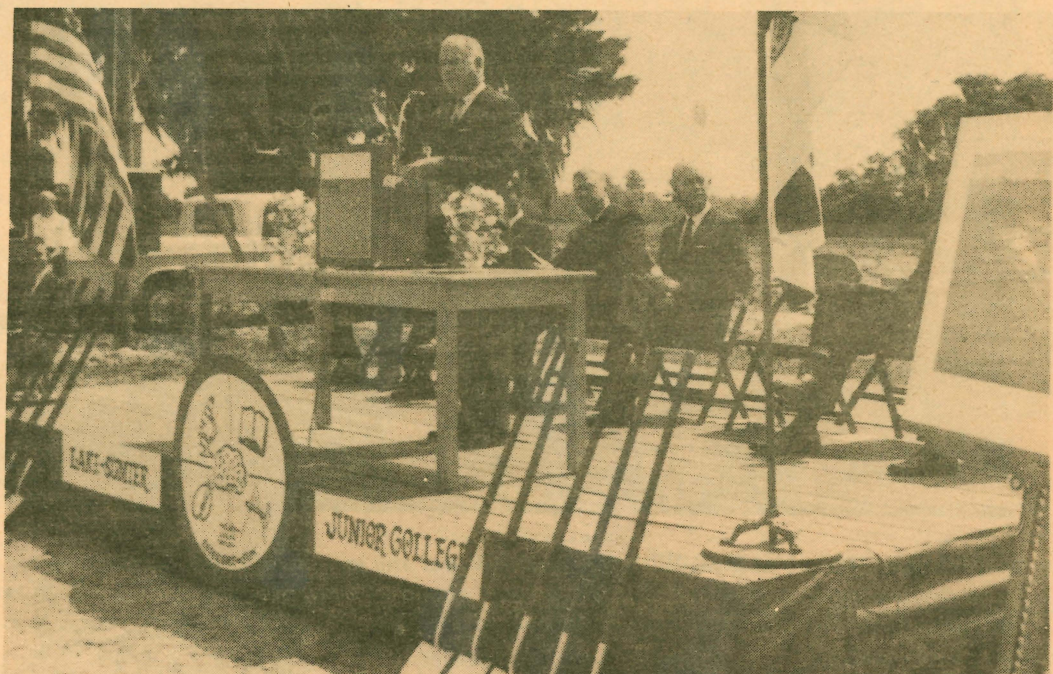

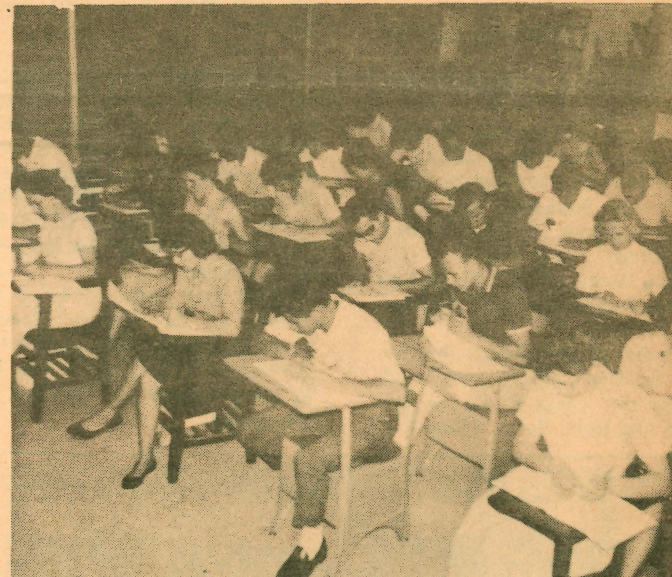

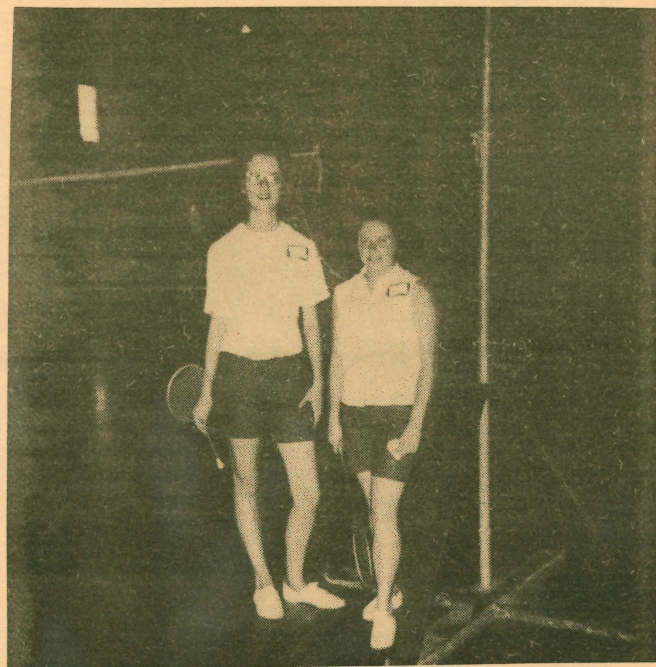
