## Student Dress Policy Set

Any attempts by students of Lake-Sumter Junior College to ook "shabby" will not be toler ted. Violators will be referred o the Dean of Students by a student government member, or faculty member. Abuse of these privileges may result in suspension from school.
Specific restrictions are as ollows

1. Students of Lake - Sumter Junior College will be permitted to wear shorts with he following qualifications: Only loose fitting, knee length bermudas
b. No cut-off jeans or cutoff slacks
STUDENTS SHOULD REAL IZE THAT THE WEARING OF SHORTS ON CAMPUS IS A PRIVILEGE ENJOYED BY FEW JUNIOR COLLEGES IN FLORIDA. STUDENTS SHOULD NOT ABUSE THIS PRIVILEGE.
2. Shirt tails must be tucked in, with the exception of certain styles of square cuts which are designed to be worn out. Cut-off sweat shirts will not be allowed.
3. The women of Lake-Sumter Junior College will not be allowed to wear slacks, slim-jims, jeans, or peddlepushers.
