Student Dress Policy Set

Any attempts by students of Lake-Sumter Junior College to look "shabby" will not be toler-ated. Violators will be referred to the Dean of Students by a student government member, or faculty member. Abuse of these privileges may result in suspension from school.

Specific restrictions are as

- 1. Students of Lake Sumter Junior College will be permitted to wear shorts with the following qualifications: a. Only loose fitting, knee length bermudas.
- b. No cut-off jeans or cutoff slacks.

Who Wears the Pani At This College?

Recently there has been much controversy, initiated by the female students at Lake-Sumter, as to whether or not girls should wear slacks on campus. Actually this is not a very big problem. 
