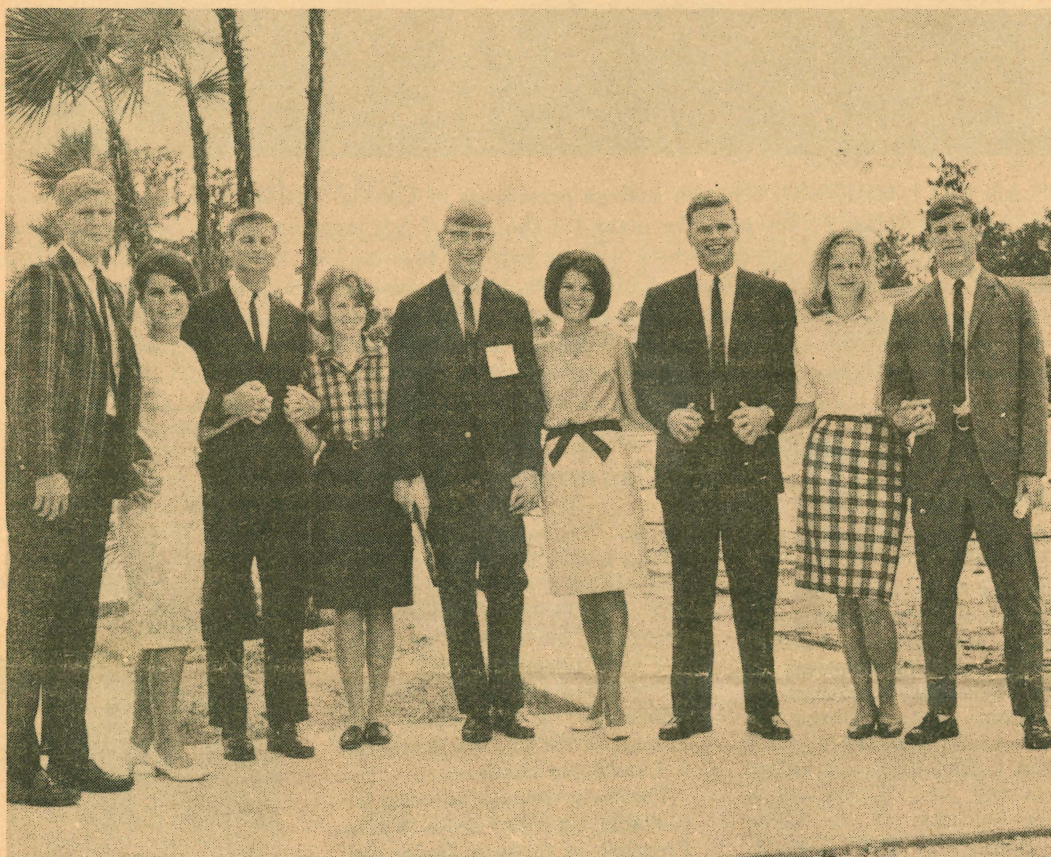

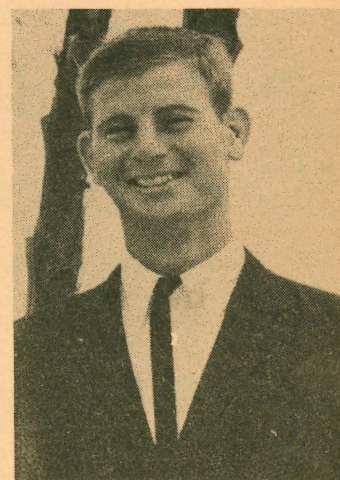

The college is planning a 6-weeks' summer session beginning June 21 and ending August 5. Registration will be held in the college library on June 18 from 8 to 12 A.M. Please contact Dean Bruns before June 1 regarding admission. Fees are \$8.00 per semester hour for Lake and Sumter County students.

One prime advantage of this program is that a student will be able to acquire up to seven semester hours of credit which might, therefore, make it possible for such a student to take a reduced load next year.

In addition, students who have failed a course might find it possible to make up such a course prior to the Fall, 1965 term.

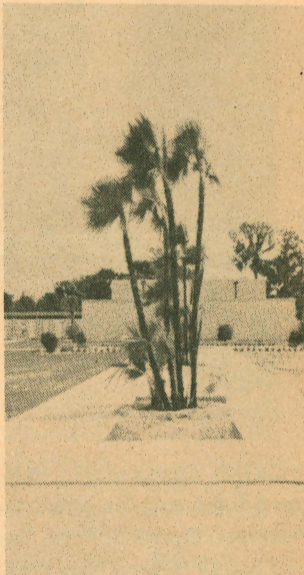
## College Hosts Planning Committee

First, a study of drafting technology was made to see if changes should be made in courses already offered, or if the change should be to mechanical technology design and production.

Secondly, new courses now under consideration are:

- Citrus Technology
- Lab Technology
- Oceanography
- Dental Technology
- X-Ray Technology
- Electrical Technology

And last, the promotion of a public relations group to help in the selection of speakers to give talks on the role of technology in the world today, as well as to underline the role of the community.

For anyone.

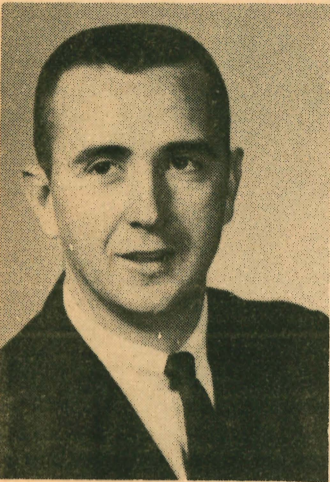

The Division of Business and Business Education has the pleasure of announcing the appointment of Kenneth Bragg, Bowling Green, Kentucky, as the Coordinator of the Mid-Management program.

Mr. Bragg is a graduate of Western Kentucky State College, Bowling Green, Kentucky, with both his B. S. and M. A. in Business. He was employed in supervisory positions with Sears Robuck, Ford Motor Company, and the Dupont Co. before he started his teaching career. Mr. Bragg is married and has two children.

The Mid-Management program is being inaugurated at Lake-Sumter to give a comprehensive training in the field of distribution. The terminal program includes supervised work experience as well as regular classroom experience.

There are four objectives:

1. To interpret the basic concepts and functions of distribution.
2. To study the economic problems of modern business.
3. To provide the student with a progressive laboratory experience in cooperation with the employer.
4. To encourage continuous education for all levels of distribution to meet present-day needs.

The true strength of the program rests on its application of cooperative training for distributive occupations.

The cooperative plan features a practical arrangement by which each student is placed in an occupational situation and trained in the responsibilities and attitudes required on the positions which exist in his career interest.

The program will be open to students in September 1965. The student shall be admitted to the junior college through the usual entrance procedures. When the student has completed his first semester successfully he will then go into his Mid-Management specialties. The special courses include Advertising, Retailing, Merchandising, and Marketing. The other courses will be the regular general education courses of the junior college.

## Stork Visits Faculty

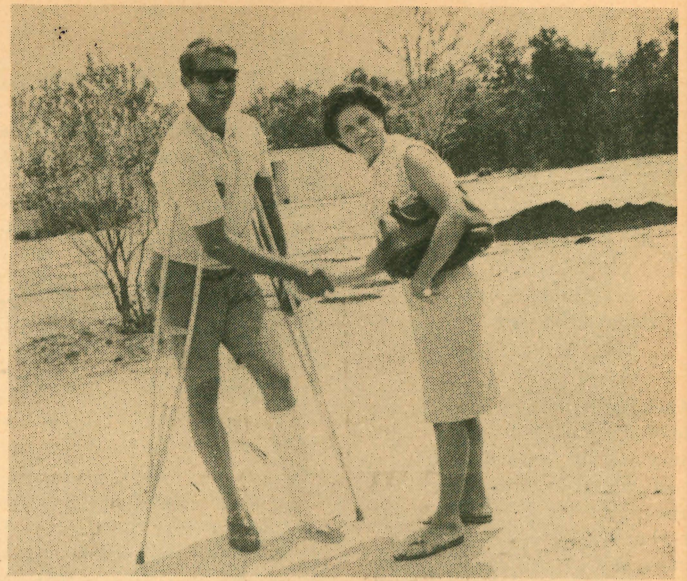
The patter of little feet has reached stampede proportions.
