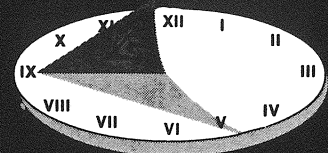

## A MESSAGE FROM DR. WESTRICK

Welcome back to faculty and welcome to all new employees of the College. Those of us who have been here during the summer months have been busily preparing for the new academic year. The challenges and opportunities ahead of us this year will be exciting and rewarding.

*First and foremost* of those challenges is the kick-off of the SACS Self-Study year. The activities involved with the Self-Study will be very beneficial to the College, the students and to those personally participating in them. Dr. Carolyn Meyer, Chair of the SACS Self-Study, has given us a tremendous head start into this process during the past year. We look forward to working closely with her and the Committees that will be moving us toward the final goal of reaffirmation of accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in the year 2000.

*Secondly*, Mr. Glenn Ricci, Director of Arts & Sciences, and Ms. Mary Jo Rager, Director of Business & Technologies, will be assuming major roles in the academic area. This will allow Dr. Sylvia Thomasson, Executive Vice-President and Vice-President of Educational Services, to move into a key position with the development of the South Lake Center. Curricular changes, completion points and workforce development activities are important items that will also be in the forefront.

*Thirdly*, the South Lake Center construction will be under way by the time this article is printed. Our

hope is that the Phase I facility will be available to us by June or July of 1999. Planning has already begun with the University of Central Florida for Phase II of the South Lake Center. Expected completion of Phase II is estimated by 2001.

*Fourthly*, at the Sumter Center, a new library/student services facility will be constructed which will also house the headquarters of the Sumter County Library System. Construction should begin during the Fall Term. Mr. Jim Thigpen, Director of the Sumter Center, and his Committee are working with the architects and Sumter County officials to finalize the design drawings.

*Fifthly*, Inter-Collegiate Athletics will again be a part of the activities available to our students. LSCC student athletes will be involved with volleyball, softball and baseball this year. Mr. Mike Matulia, Athletic Director, is working with Mr. Ray Kinsey, Vice-President of Administrative Services, and the architects to remodel the Gymnasium during the next two years. Also part of the plan is to develop new fields for softball and baseball. The tennis and racquetball courts will be added to the facilities upon completion of the fields.

Obviously, there are many more items that could be listed as challenges and/or opportunities to be faced this year. We do anticipate being very busy in all areas of the College. **Thank you for your continuing support as we begin a very exciting 1998-99.** --Robert W. Westrick, President

### ***LSCC Students Place in Phi Beta Lambda National Leadership Conference***

LSCC students Amber Patterson, Tiffany Hilliard, and Valerie Tyre represented Florida in the business events of management, marketing and human resource management of the 1998 Phi Beta Lambda (PBL) National Leadership Conference held July 10 – 13 in Orlando, Florida. Approximately 1700 students from two and four year colleges and universities from all over the country attended to com-

pete in business academic competition.

The top ten students in each event are recognized at an awards program. LSCC's own Amber Patterson placed first in the nation in the management category. Although Hilliard and Tyre did not place, these students earned the right to represent Florida through state competition and it is considered to be an honor.

Each state is only allowed to enter

two students in each business event. Hilliard and Tyre are considered to be one of the top 100 students in the country in their particular event.

The theme of the conference this year was "A Celebration of Character." Organizations such as Walt Disney World, Universal Studios, Lockheed Martin, and NeVry Institutes of Technology were at the conference conducting interviews with students

### ***LSCC's Reach Out Program Thanks Its Supporters***

Lake-Sumter Community College hosted the College Readiness Program for three weeks during the month of July. The readiness program is part of the College Reach-Out Program, which offers five comprehensive programs to enhance students' academic enrichment and to prepare them for

entry into post secondary institutions. Nearly 50 students from Lake and Sumter counties participated in this year's program.

### ***LSCC To Host Forum On Simulation Technology***

Lake-Sumter Community College will host a special TV panel forum telecast and interview session on July 15 from 3 – 4 p.m. on its own Channel 13. The purpose of the FORUM is to introduce simulation technology as one of the most important resources to the Florida economy; generating \$2-3 billion annually while giving the state, and particularly Central Florida, a powerful industrial foundation offering strong potential for growth.

The first technology roundtable

forum, produced by Spacecraft Productions Unit of the National Center for Simulation, will be bringing together key representatives of high technology including aerospace, military and commercial interests, local government and academia. Orlando attorney and former U.S. Representative Lou Frey will host the Forum.

The telecast, which will be live in Lake and Sumter Counties, is a "meeting of the minds" about the current situation of high technology, specifically simulation, in Central Florida.

The program will be preceded by several interview sessions with panelists and others answering questions about Central Florida's part in simulation technology and its future role.

The live broadcast will air July 15 at 3 p.m. on LSCC Channel 13. Rebroadcasts are scheduled on July 18, 19; Aug 8, 9 at 12 noon and 4 p.m. each date. Additional broadcasts throughout Central Florida via Time Warner Communications cable channels are being scheduled.

## WE DID IT!!! Thanks to you ...

We recently heard from Senators Bob Graham and Corrine Brown's offices that our Talent Search application we submitted last fall has been selected for funding! Not only was it funded, but the fact that we were funded for five years means that we scored in the top 10% of all funded proposals. We don't know our actual score yet, but it had to be close to a 100.

One of the sections we must have received the maximum points for was the area of applicant support. We included 32 letters of support from LSCC faculty, staff, and students which represented over 100 individuals. Thanks to these folks, whom I will list below, we will receive over a million dollars during the next 5 years to service 12 middle and high schools in Lake and Sumter counties beginning this Sept. 1. This will allow us to hire 4 full-time employees (3 professionals and 1 clerical) to help in Student Services at each of our three campuses. We will be serving approximately 600 students each year who ultimately may become our students after high school graduation.

Gymnasium construction for the new convocation center will begin at the completion of volleyball

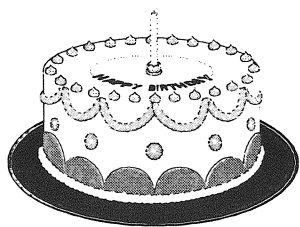

### UCF 2+2 Elementary Education

We had an excellent meeting with representatives from the UCF College of Education to work on details for beginning the bachelor's program in elementary education this fall at our Leesburg campus (planned to begin in September). We were presented with the tentative schedule of courses (15crs) for Fall and the rest of the program (2 years, one course in Summer). We are looking at courses late afternoon/evenings/ Saturdays - which will be firmed after a meeting with prospective students.

A letter will be sent next week from the UCF Col. of Ed. to all students on our list (over 90), which will include the meeting date the following week with students (tentatively scheduled for Wednesday August 7 at 4 p.m. in MP002). We have been provided with UCF applications and provisional applications (given to Mr. Evans) and we have been asked to hold these until requested.

Please provide this information to students inquiring about the 2+2 in El Ed Program. We will be copied and will forward to Mr. Ricci and Mr. Evans any UCF communications with students that we receive. UCF is coordinating the news release with the details once finalized, which will come from their College of Education Dean and President Westrick, in addition to mailings to the school systems, advertisements, etc.
