The **Educational Talent Search** program kicked off their 2nd annual Summer Tour on June 10. Kristina Moore, South Lake EST Coordinator reports that over 100 Lake and Sumter County middle and high school students participated in the event. The two-week program was separated into two

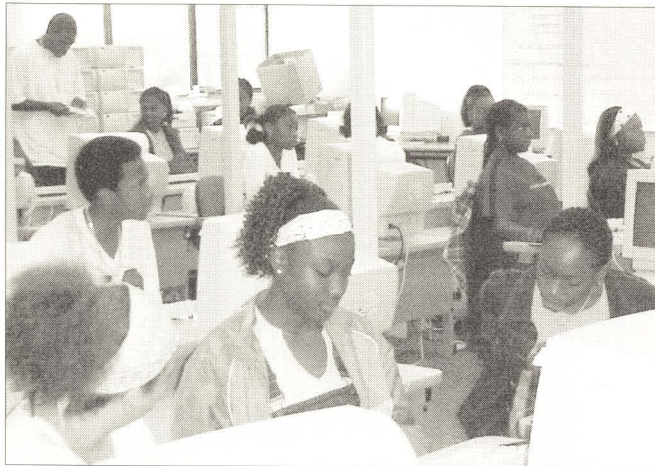
sessions for each age group to allow for more students. Middle school students started their session June 10th, when they attended the Sumter Campus' Educational Conference, where the Boy's and Girl's Clubs of Lake and Sumter Counties presented a program called ENABL (Education Now and Babies Later). The next day the group traveled to the Kennedy Space Center (above photo). The second half of the Educational Conference took place on the South Lake Campus on June 12th, where students completed the ENABL program, and learned about nutrition from the Lake County branch of the UF's 4-H program. They also participated in challenge games presented by the ETS staff. The middle school Summer Tour culminated with the first ETS Family Picnic on June 13th. Students had the opportunity to bring their families to Waterfront Park in Clermont to enjoy food catered by T-Bones of Eustis and to play basketball, volleyball, and other fun activities.

High school students also began the Tour at the Sumter Campus on June 17 for their version of the ENABL program. They toured UCF's main campus the next day, and saw presentations by its financial aid and residence life offices. They continued their Educational Conference at the South Lake Campus, where their activities included a 4-H presentation on money management, as well as the ENABL program, challenge games, and the family picnic on June 20th.

The grand finale was ETS's appreciation day, when the 100+ Educational Conference attendees were treated to a June 21st trip to Busch Gardens. Kristina adds, "The best thing about the Summer Tour is that everything is free to active ETS students. We provide transportation from centrally-located areas throughout Lake and Sumter Counties, and lunch was provided each day. Many parents also volunteered to help us out. The ETS program looks forward all year long to this exciting event. Plans are already under way for 2003's Summer Tour."

YET ANOTHER ACCOMPLISHMENT...LSCC'S ETS program, in its fifth and final year of its current grant, has once again been awarded funding through a Department of Education grant for the next four years. Congratulations to Manager Rey Cortes, Kristina, Sumter Coordinators Sam Parish and Brian Jacobik, staff assistant Sandy Poe, and Grants Coordinator Bonnie Holloway for a job well done.

LSCC's CROP Hosts College Readiness Workshop

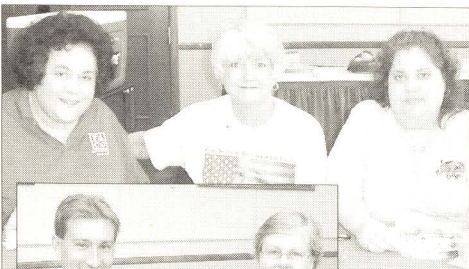


LSCC's College Reach Out Program (CROP) sponsored its annual College Readiness Workshop from July 8th through 25th. CROP's objective is to strengthen the educational motivation and preparation of low-income and educationally disadvantaged students in grades 6-12 who otherwise would be unlikely to continue their education to a post-secondary level. Sixty students from Wildwood, South Sumter, Eustis, Mount Dora and Tavares middle schools attended the three-week Workshop that concentrated on FCAT activities...question samples, writing exercises and computer education. Those who completed the entire program received a free trip to Islands of Adventure. 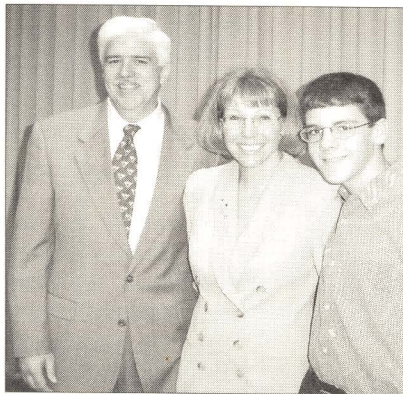
From the President...

Reference/Instruction Librarian Rhonda Smith asks "What do the following have in common? Dream Singers: *The African-American Way With Dreams*,

As She Likes it: Shakespeare's Unruly Women, *Cisco: The Complete Reference*, *Social Relations and Chronic Pain*, *Seven Steps to a Successful Business Plan*, and *The Cold War: An International History*? They've all been published this year and they are among the 4000 plus titles that have just been added to LSCC's netLibrary collection."

This brings the total to over 20,000 books available to faculty, staff and students from any Internet computer. Almost all academic subjects are covered. You can search netLibrary just like you'd search



database, by author, title, subject, text word, etc. Records will soon be added to LINCC Search so that netLibrary titles also show up

when you look in the main library catalog. Once you've found a book you're interested in, you can page through it, use its electronic table of contents to move to a specific chapter, or search the book for key words. You can add bookmarks or notes to the electronic page, cut and paste quotations to your word processing program, and print extracts within the limits of copyright law. There's even a built-in written and aural dictionary, so students can check the meaning or pronunciation of unfamiliar terms. Access: www.lsccl.cc.fl.us/library, then link to netLibrary.
