## BECOME AN LSCC STAR-GAZER

Astronomy Instructor Dr. Terry Mitchell is excited about a new arrival...LSCC's 200 mm (8-inch) LX200GPS Schmidt-Cassegrain Telescope. Manufactured by Meade Instruments, it is the largest telescope in Lake and Sumter counties. The telescope will be formally dedicated as the Columbia Memorial Astronomical Telescope (CMAT), in honor of the astronauts who perished in the Space Shuttle Columbia tragedy. Faculty and LSCC students are invited to the dedication and unveiling on Monday, March 24th in front of Building 2, on the South Lake Campus at 7:30 pm. Purchased with funds provided by the LSCC Foundation, the CMAT has a completely automatic self-alignment system, which uses the national GPS satellites to tell the telescope where it is, the time of day, and where the North Star, Polaris, is located. Once the telescope has this information, it can use its Autostar II computer to navigate to any one of over 145,000 celestial objects stored in its database. It can even take the user on a guided tour of objects visible in the night sky on any given day of the year. CMAT is capable of taking 35 mm photographs or CCD digital images of whatever is being viewed. "Initially the telescope will be used in South Lake classes, but the CMAT is portable, so it can be used at any campus," Dr. Mitchell explains. "We will also be able to open the CMAT for public viewing from time to time."

## Ken Bragg Appointed Business Assistance Center Manager

Workforce Development Director Janice Adkinson announces that Ken Bragg has been selected as the manager of LSCC's new Business Assistance Center. Ken brings a wealth of experience in initiating technical education programs that provide employee training. The Founding Director and Chief Administrative Officer for the Kenneth A. Bragg Regional Public Safety Complex and the Lake County Vo-Tech Center, he has worked at the state and national levels in legislative relationships, lobbying, securing program funding, grants, writing legislation, economic development and job training. Holding a Bachelor's and Master's degree from Western Kentucky University, he serves on the boards of SunTrust Banks, Habitat for Humanity and the LSCC Foundation, where he is Chairman of the Endowment and Planned Giving Committee.
The Business Assistance Center, located in the Leesburg Campus' Learning Center, was developed through a partnership between LSCC, the Lake County Board of County Commissioners and the Service Core of Retired Executives (SCORE), as well as other economic develop-ment-oriented businesses, municipalities and agencies. Janice says the Center's goal is to locate services and resources, and to provide training and seminars to assist new and existing businesses... all in a central location. She adds that SCORE will be a major source for business counseling and, along with LSCC's Corporate Training and Continuing Education offices, be an integral part of the training services.

## From the President. .

In February, LSCC joined colleges and universities around the nation to celebrate African American History Month, which traces its roots to 1926.
According to the Community College Times, black history owes much of its beginnings to Carter Woodson, the son of former slaves, who spent his childhood toiling in Kentucky coal mines. But his determination to acquire an education led him to Harvard where he earned a Ph.D. After distinguishing himself in the field by exploring little known African American history, Dr. Woodson launched "Negro History Week" to bring national attention to the contributions of black people throughout American history.
Today, Dr. Woodson's legacy lives on as we honor black Americans, from war heroes to musicians to educators. LSCC is indebted to the college's Equity and Diversity Committee for spearheading the African American History Month events. On February 16, we were delighted and moved by the spirit of the InterFaith Choirs performing at our Fine Arts Center. On March 2, we experienced the "Dance Unto God Troupe." We are most fortunate that Ms. Christyne Hamilton, who began her distinctive career serving the Florida Community College System at LSCC, has returned to the community and is leading the committee, which chose as our theme, "Celebrating Diversity and Our Common Heritage." I think the committee made a most appropriate choice. We have strength in our uniqueness and we enjoy the great richness that our variety brings. We have so much we can learn from one another because we come from such different places and cultures. At the same time, our theme emphasized that what has made our country great is that once we are here, whether we came from Italy, Ireland, Spain, China, Japan or Africa, we pride ourselves on being Americans. We are creating our common heritage as we join together celebrating events as different as African American History Month, Mardi Gras, and St. Patrick's Day.
I would like to suggest that we add to our theme the phrase "As We Build Our Shared Future." While it is important that we look back to recognize and appreciate the heroes and heroines of the past, it is even more important that we draw inspiration from them to make our future one that holds promise for all people, regardless of race, religion, culture, age or gender. We can't relive the good times of the past, nor can we change the evils of the past. However, the future belongs to us. It is ours to shape for ourselves, our children and our grandchildren. As we look forward to March's celebration of Women's History, let's not lose sight of the fact that history is only valuable if we learn from it and use those lessons to build a brighter future.
