Saying that four of LSCC's nursing faculty were goodwill ambassadors would be understatement. The group volunteered its time over spring break to travel to Comitancillo, in the remote highlands of Guatemala. There they administered much-needed medical treatment to the village's residents. The nurses, all ARNP's, treated every kind of medical ailment, as well as

providing health and nutritional information to more than 300 patients. The group not only operated a free clinic from March 7th through March 15th, but also donated all of the medical supplies. Trish Economidis, ARNP (pediatrics), Griffin, ARNP (geriatrics), Pennacchia, ARNP (women's health), and Gerri Tulley, ARNP (adult health) joined the Mission, along with other members of Judy Messier's Trinity Evangelical Free Church.

"It was a life changing experience," says Susan, "to live among people who lack the things we all take for granted, yet are so capable of finding happiness in their everyday lives."



However, the leadership of the Council of Presidents and the Florida Association of Community Colleges has resulted in a consistent and unified message that is winning many supporters. While there is not yet any good news to report, we can say that the community colleges have so far been spared the dramatic cuts that many agencies and programs are battling. However, with our rapid enrollment growth, lack of new funding really amounts to a budget cut.

We have a great deal of work ahead of us and I urge you to support FACC, and contact your legislators to express your concerns. Our well-respected local legislative delegation has gained positions of leadership, and spearheaded one of the few community college bills to be filed this year. Senator Anna Cowin and Representative Hugh Gibson are pushing a bill that will help us with dual enrollment funding. Please thank our legislators for their hard work, but let them know that there is still much more support needed by our colleges if we are to maintain an accessible, quality education for our students.
