Title III Technology Fair

During the past three years, LSCC has seen a continuous growth in its enrollment, culminating in a 15% increase this year. With this growth comes a greater demand for faculty, staff, student services, facilities, and modern equipment and technology throughout the College. It is well known that funding from the state legisla-

ture has not been able to cover these needs, so LSCC's

ministration has taken the initiative to address the ever increasing needs of the College district through a reorganization plan. Last fall's community listening sessions indicated that the success of the College was dependent upon the availability of highly-qualified faculty and student services staff in all College campus locations. With this in mind, President Dr. Charles Mojock has defined a term called the "One College Concept." The "One College" goal in this concept has been strengthened by increasing the resources for direct services on all campuses, while minimizing administrative overhead. This will be accomplished by assigning senior staff to oversee the operations of all campuses. With many responsibilities such as, academic scheduling, human resources, facilities, marketing, purchasing, financial aid and accounting already being performed on a College-wide basis, the merging of the remaining individual campus administrative duties will create a more efficient and streamlined operation.

While this new organization meant the elimination of the full-time campus administrator positions, the management plan includes the assignment of advisors, who report directly to the president to advocate for the community. They are: Ken Bragg-Leesburg Campus (below, 1-r), Jim







Thigpen -Sumter Campus and Jane Miller-South Lake Campus.

Sumter's Betsy Ruano and South Lake's Sean Armstrong (right, 1-r), act as liaisons in the coordination of campus activities. Senior administra-





tors, from the president to the vice presidents and deans, also have regular weekly schedules on each campus.



"The Learning Center recently opened new lab space for students studying the biological sciences," reports Dr. Bill Kennedy.

"Microbiology, anatomy, and physiology stu-

dents now have a larger, more accommodating space in which to review and prepare for classes and exams." Moving staff and rearranging office space allowed for consolidation of science materials into two adjacent spaces. The new, larger room (LC 134) now consolidates a television, VCR, models of two torsos, a skeleton, an arm and a leg, a skull, and various body parts, and can comfortably accommodate eight students. Two computers dedicated to the sciences have been placed in the adjacent room (LC 137).

"Student reaction has been positive," adds Bill. "One anatomy student said, 'This is great! We have room to spread everything around without taking the models into the English lab.' Word from instructors has also been very supportive."

LSCC's athletic director Mike Matulia announced that Steve Benson will be the College's new head volleyball coach for 2003-2004. "Coach Benson will also be the coordinator of College recruiting," said Matulia. "This new position will provide the opportunity to recruit more high school students, as well as provide greater continuity within the athletic program." The full-time position was made possible through a two-year grant by the First National

Bank of Mount Dora on behalf of the Charles and Mary McLin Foundation.

If Steve looks familiar, it is because he has been the Lady Lakers assistant volleyball coach for the last three years. He has a B.A. in physical education from North Park University in Chicago, and a wealth of coaching experience. He is also director of the Lake County Juniors Volleyball program. Welcome also to First Assistant Coach Tami Bysura and Second Assistant Coach Jim Hoffman. The season kicks-off August 23 in Jackson-ville, but the ladies will be on home court the first time Tuesday, August 26. Director Janice Adkinson (2nd from right) was LSCC's representative at a check presentation by Workforce Florida, Inc. to Eli Bailey (far left) on July 21. Owner of Bailey Industries, he received a \$38,000 grant to use in training current employees. He applied for the grant with the assistance of LSCC, Metro Orlando EDC, City of Leesburg and the Leesburg Chamber of Commerce. Janice and Jim Thigpen are also

helping Mr. Bailey apply for a large grant to train workers to support the expansion of his Leesburg company. On July 16, Janice, Jim and Ken Bragg attended a check presentation to the City of Leesburg from the USDA. The \$250,000 grant will be used to establish a new Business and Technology Center. It will serve as an incubator for entrepreneurs, and work in partnership with LSCC's Business Assistance Center. The same day, Janice, Jim and Ken, along with Lake County EDC staff, visited Orlando's new National Entrepreneurial Center, a joint project of UCF, SBA and Disney.

The reorganization also included eliminating the director of purchasing, database coordinator, accounting coordinator and Leesburg switchboard operator positions, which allowed reallocation of funding for much-needed faculty positions. Three full-time and one part-time instructor have been hired and a South Lake Campus academic/financial aid advisor position has been added. Vacant positions have been filled by former Learning Center Manager Tabitha Richards, now director of Admissions/Registrar (left, I-r), and by David Sankies, director of Financial Aid. Fortunately for LSCC, David was a financial aid Banner consultant for SCT. The human resource director position has been posted.

Due to the fact that state funding is not keeping up with LSCC's growth, financial support from the community and the development of corporate partnerships are increasingly important. The new office of Corporate Training and Community Services, headed by Jim Thigpen, has the goal to develop these relationships, as well raise the visibility of


LSCC's Business Assistance Center. The department also includes Continuing Education, Computer Institute and Corporate Training. After helping create LSCC's 2003-04 financial plan, John Froman (right) is the new director of Budget and Management Reports. He will lead the budget development process and insure that LSCC maintains accurate and complete data for management analysis and state/federal reports. These reports are very crucial to the funding, accreditation and evaluation of the LSCC.



"The reorganization plan will enhance interaction between the senior administration and the Sumter and south Lake communities and campuses," says Dr. Mojock. "Its benefits include the hiring of 3.5 faculty positions, a student services position and three direct instructional/service positions, as well as filling critical vacancies-all without any increase in personnel cost. Though such a plan involved hard decisions, its implementation was needed to enhance and expand LSCC's reputation for high quality cost-effective academic and administrative services to the entire College service district."



Rosanne Brandeburg reports that Foundation Scholarship Committee members: Margo Odom (Chair), Kristen Bartch, Tom Cook, Claudia Covil, Jack Daniels, Kathy Dawson, Sue Fagan, Bernadette Leware, Donna MacDonald, Mariah Rumford and Leigh Skeham reviewed 286 scholarship applications and were able to award 61, totaling \$34,450.

The Annual Scholarship Campaign will kick-off Tuesday, September 16 Its 2003-04 goal...to exceed last year's total of \$107,772.

LSCC received two grants from the Charles B. and Mary M. McLin Foundation via the First National Bank of Mount Dora. A \$50,000 grant for a skilled nursing lab and a \$43,700 grant for the athletic department to be used for new weight room equipment, the volleyball program and an athletic trainer.

# From the President ...

Welcome to August, what used to be called the "dog days of summer" when I was growing

up. I was never really sure where this term came from. I always assumed it was because it was so hot that everyone felt lazy. But since it's always so hot here in sunny Florida, I'm not sure that applies!

At any rate, August is anything but lazy here at LSCC. We've been hard at it over the summer - getting our budget in place; interviewing faculty; admitting and registering students and getting ready for the start up of Fall semester. On the staffing front, you'll be pleased to know that we have commitments for five of the six faculty positions and we're still working on the last one. We have our new VP, Dick Scott and Director of Financial Aid, David Sankies on board, and Jim Thigpen, Tabitha Richards and John Froman assuming new roles.

The good news and bad news is that enrollment is booming. We are more than 50% ahead of where we were last year in applications. The bad news is that classes are already filling up, and even with the new faculty, we don't have capacity to handle the demand. During the legislative session, we warned that access to community college education was threatened, not just at the large urban schools, but statewide. That prediction is coming true, I'm afraid. I know I can count on each of you to step up once again, so that we can continue to do our best to serve the needs of our community.

The legislature's failure to fund enrollment growth also affects our ability to properly reward our employees for a job well done. Our Planning Council did a great job setting priorities in this tough budget year. The Board strongly endorsed our plan to provide each full-time non-faculty employee with a \$400 bonus, and to advance faculty one step (about 1.6%) on the salary schedule. Even more significant is that our adjunct faculty, who have gone without a raise for several years, will receive a 7% increase this year. That was a real sacrifice by the full-time employees and I'm so proud of all of you. The Trustees praised the college family and expressed their desire to do more, but it's just not possible this year. Thanks to all the budget managers and each of you for the careful budget management you exercised last year. Thanks to you, we have some \$100,000 in surplus dollars that we'll use to fund our Technology plan and instructional equipment needs. It's amazing what can be accomplish when everyone pitches in to help!

As I enter my second year with you here at LSCC, I am even more excited and enthusiastic than I was last year. Then, I had hopes that we would find a way to work together to fulfill our mission of student success. Today, I know that we have developed a solid, effective team based on common vision, trust and good communication that is poised to accomplish even bigger and better things this year with our "road map" strategic plan in place. I look forward to welcoming all of you back at Convocation on August 19. Remember to dress smart and "look mahvelous darling."
