## From the President.

September was a recordsetting month for LSCC. We started the month with the announcement that our partnership with G\&T Conveyor and the Metro Orlando EDC resulted in our first State of Florida Quick Response Training grant. Our application on behalf of G \& T was approved for $\$ 280,031$. This is the largest such grant to a Lake County firm ever awarded. LSCC will be partnering with Rollins College and Lake Tech Center to provide employee training to support the company's planned expansion to 500 plus employees. $G \& T$ is a home-grown company, headed by John Majewski. It is the only US firm manufacturing equipment for airport luggage handling and screening. They provide good paying skilled jobs, as well as a number of opportunities for engineers, managers and computer software professionals. LSCC is proud of its role in this training effort because it will increase the availability of good jobs for our students, enhance the economic vitality of our community and expand our tax base. If you've seen a large new building going up on CR448 near CR561 in Tavares, that's G \& T's new home.

We ended the month with an historic event as Governor Jeb Bush made his first visit to our college. The governor was here to meet with the Florida Association of Community Colleges Policy and Advocacy Committee, which is comprised of the presidents from the "Great 28 " community colleges. Governor Bush and Florida's Chancellor of Community Colleges David Armstrong
have made a commitment to meet with us several times a year to discuss our issues and concerns. "Unlike other higher education institutions, community colleges' open-door policy allows anyone wanting an education to have that opportunity," said Governor Bush. "That's a great thing, and it's important that these colleges find the support they need." The presidents thanked the governor for his support, but warned that the continuous inade-quately-funded growth over the past three years was placing our opendoor mission in jeopardy. Most of the presidents reported having students who were not able find seats in the classes they needed, and some 35,000 students statewide were turned away. Here at LSCC, we estimate that about 300 students were not able to register for classes. The governor responded that community colleges would move toward the "front of the line" in his budget priorities. Unfortunately, the governor did not have time to meet with the campus community. However, LSCC student leaders were able to speak with the governor prior to the start of the FACC meeting. I was impressed with the governor's comfort with the students, who were quite impressive themselves. When the governor asked them about their future plans, they were most articulate about their educational and career goals. I want to commend all our staff, especially facilities, security, college relations and the president's office for their hard work and preparation. Everything went smoothly and all of the presidents commented on the hospitality. I believe LSCC came out of this looking like the great community college it is.
