

L-SJC Parking, Traffic Laws


Even though the permanent parking and paving facilities are not yet complete, temporary areas have been arranged so that adequate parking is available for faculty and students alike.

Due to the limited space for parking and the high speed traffic located on Hwy. 441, stringent policies for parking and for flow of traffic will be followed, states Dean Bruns. 1. All traffic on the new campus will be one way. The entrance will be located on the southeast corner of the campus off of Highway 441, with exit on the southwest corner back onto Hwy. 441. No traffic is permited on the presently existing road through the center of the campus in front of the library. 2. Maximum speed on campus is 15 miles per hour. 3.

The parking area immediately adjacent to the entrance from Hwy. 441 on the east side of the road is reserved for faculty and visitors only. 4. The second parking area located in the front center of the campus is reserved for school bus parking. 5. All student parking is located on the inner drive across the front of the campus with diagonal parking facing highway 441.

Permanent Parking

Until our permanent parking and traffic facilities are completed some traffic problems are anticipated. If students will follow the above listed procedures a minimum amount of trouble will be encountered. Students, please be careful when leaving and entering the campus onto highway 441 where high speed traffic flows!

Welcome to the new Lake-Sumter Junior College! After several years of hard work and much planning the first phase of the permanent campus at Silver Lake is being opened. Left behind is most of the temporary campus adjacent to Leesburg High School. Thompson Brothers Construction Company of Leesburg was responsible for completion of this four-building, \$502,-218 project.

Study Aids

Pleasing to everyone concerned are the new facilities. The Li-brary Building provides seating for 100 students as compared with 30 in the old library. It is also temporarily housing the college administration and bookstore. The general classrooms building, designated as Building A, has art, music, business education, and general classrooms. The language lab and teaching auditorium together are designated as Building B. These facilities will be used in language, shorthand, business education, speech, and music appreciation classes. Building C, the science building, houses facilities for drafting and technology, physics, chemistry and biology laboratories, and general classrooms. All buildings have faculty offices.

The Student Policies Committee of the L-SJC SGA, with Bill Bozeman and Buddy Hooten as co-chairmen, presented the following policies adopted by the SGA. For study, research, or just plain relaxing between classes, the new library offers pleasant surroundings and brand-new facilities. Comfortable new chairs and tables, individual study nooks, and many large new shelves are part of the new look in the spacious library. Warm, weather and sunny skies invite students to study out on the screened-in porch or on the steps over-looking the pond to the west.

The brightness, spaciousness, and casualness of the new library will be welcome changes to students used to squeezing past chairs and between tables and shelves. Hopefully, students will be kind to their new library facilities in gratitude for such luxury.

Restaurant Vandalism —

Members of the team, cheerleaders, and SGA members as well as fans are guilty of restaurant vandalism.

I might add that the way L-SJC 'ers conduct themselves in these establishments is far from commendable, too. This boisterousness (of which I am as guilty as anyone) has to stop! Put yourself in the place of some of the adults like which we are trying to become: would you like to be run out of a restaurant on one of your few nights out by a gang of ill-bred college students?

Swimming Classes Offered

Beginning Swimming

Beginning swimming course will include instruction in the fundamentals of beginning swimming with emphasis on safety practices. The course is designed for the person who is for a beginner rank (cannot swim the length of the pool if his life depended on it).

Intermediate Swimming course is designed for the student whose swimming skill is beyond the level of beginner. Emphasis will be placed on safety practices and the following strokes: elementary back stroke, crawl stroke, side stroke, trudgeon, back stroke, and breast stroke.

American Red Cross Lifesaving is open to all L-SJC students who can pass the following qualifying swimming tests: (1) swim continously for 440, yds.; (2) surface dive to a depth of 7 ft., level off, and swim two body lengths; (3) execute a good standing dive from deck of pool; (4) tread water for a minimum of 3 minutes.

American Red Cross Instructors Course is open to all L-SJC students that have taken the ARCS course and successfully completed it. Students will not be able to register for this course without being able to furnish proof that they have completed the ARCS course.

Harmon Gets 27 to Pace Laker Five

The Silver Lakers of Lake Sumter Junior College staged a come from behind finish at Ray M. Hayes Gym last night to pick up their first win in three seasons of play over the Rebels from Central Florida Junior College of Ocala. It took five minutes of overtime to do it in but the locals pumped in ten points in that period of time while holding their taller opponents to two for as thrilling a win as you would want to see in some time. The Lakers 83 to 75 victory over the Rebels upped their season's record to six and four while leveling the visitors record to two and two. 


